


A bumper year for events

A festival for flutes

To kickstart the year, in March PFC attended the very first flute choir festival hosted by Birmingham Flute Choir.

By car-sharing, this was more than just an event to celebrate a pastime we all adore, but also a chance to socialise more than a tea break really allows for.

The day started with a mass play of the 300ish players - a delightful spectacle to both see and hear.



There were opportunities to gawp at and try all the lovely flutes on the trade stands; participate in specialty seminars and of course, performances.



We were one of the smaller groups but we were also the only ensemble to perform without a conductor.

Playing in front of 'peers' can be strangely more daunting than a regular audience, but this event also proved to be incredibly supportive and encouraging. We'll definitely sign up for the next one.

Unexpectedly, it was swift and easy to come to a unanimous decision to purchase a beautiful Pearl.
